

HOME FOR EVERYDAY LEGENDS: WMF WORLD CUP RAS AI KHAIMAH 2023

Tournament to take place from 26 October to 4 November 2023

The World Minifootball Federation (WMF) has selected Ras Al Khaimah to stage the 2023 Minifootball World Cup, cementing the Emirate's reputation as a leading sports destination.

Taking place later this year, the Emirate will host thousands of spectators and fans from around the globe. Bringing together 32 national teams to Ras Al Khaimah, the tournament will act as a springboard for the minifootball awareness in the UAE, encouraging more people to play the sport, in line with the Emirate's objectives to foster livability as well as engaging with local schools and sports clubs within the local and broader UAE community.

The Emirate already plays host to a number of high-profile events including the Ras Al Khaimah Half Marathon, the world's fastest half marathon, the UAE Cycling Championship and the UAE Tour as well as renowned international golf championships, the DP World Tour and the European Tour, to name just a few.

What is minifootball?

Minifootball, also known as small-sided football, is a smaller version of the traditional 11-a-side game that is played on smaller pitches with fewer players. Typically, the game is played with five or six players on each team, and the pitch is smaller than a standard football field. Minifootball is a fast-paced and exciting sport that requires skill, agility, and teamwork. The popularity of minifootball has grown significantly in recent years, with many countries setting up their own leagues and competitions. One of the most prestigious events in the minifootball calendar is the Minifootball World Cup, which is held every two years.

WMF World Cup Overview

The Minifootball World Cup is an international tournament that showcases the sport of minifootball. It brings together teams from around the world to compete for the prestigious title of Minifootball World Cup champions. The tournament features fast-paced, skillful, and exciting matches played on a smaller pitch with smaller teams. Players from different countries often exchange jerseys after matches, and there is a real sense of community among the participants. There are fan zones where supporters can gather to watch matches and enjoy food and drink, as well as cultural events that showcase the host country's traditions and heritage. - The 2023 Minifootball World Cup logo is inspired by the UAE's national bird, the falcon, spreading its wings to convey prestige and national pride in UAE flag colours

Did you know...

- The first Minifootball World Cup took place in the United States in 2015, with 12 teams competing. The US won, while Mexico was runner-up. Brazil and Romania took third and fourth place.
- In 2017, Tunisia was the host nation, with 24 teams competing. The winner was the Czech Republic followed by runner-up, Mexico. Senegal and Spain took third and fourth place.
- The last Minifootball World Cup took place in Perth, Australia in October 2019, with 32 teams competing. The winner was Mexico followed by runner-up, Brazil. Romania and Hungary took third and fourth place
- Each team consists of five players and one goalkeeper
- The maximum number of authorized substitutes is nine
- A match is played in two halves of 25 minutes each. The half time break is a maximum of 10 minutes
- The 50 x 30m field must be wholly natural or, if competition rules permit, a wholly artificial playing surface except where competition rules permit an integrated combination of artificial and natural materials (hybrid system). The colour of artificial surfaces must be green
- A goal is situated at the centre of each goal line, measuring 4m wide and 2m high







All balls must have a circumference between 70 cm (28 ins) and 68 cm (27 ins) and weigh between 450 g (16 oz) and 410 g (14 oz) in weight at the start of the match. The pressure of the ball must be equal to 0.6 −1.1 atmosphere (600 −1,100 g/cm²) at sea level (8.5 lbs/sq in −15.6 lbs/sq in)
